#### 1. INTRODUCTION

Within the vast field of ancient Indian literature, scholars have always been amazed and enthralled by one manuscript in particular: the Arka Prakash. This old text is said to have been written by none other than the fabled King Ravana. Admired for its esoteric meanings, this book has passed through the ages and transcended space and time to teach humanity.

Arka Prakash enlists five bheshaj-kalpa (pharmaceutical form) types. One of them is Arka Kalpana. This effective approach to medicine formation uses distillation techniques to create powerful therapeutic formulations by utilizing the gifts of nature. A number of illnesses associated with Shalakya Tantra can be alleviated and rejuvenated by these amazing preparations.

Shalakya Tantra is one of the eight branches of Ayurveda (the traditional Indian medical system). Shalakya Tantra deals with a range of diagnostic techniques as well as the prevention and treatment of conditions pertaining to the mouth, throat, ears, eyes, and head through the application of herbal medicines, detoxification protocols, and surgical techniques.

Arka Kalpana has stood the test of time in Ayurvedic medicine due to its efficacy and safety profile when prepared using traditional methods outlined in texts like Arka Prakash. Arka is free from all kinds of adverse effects of doshas and exhibits amazing healing properties. The

#### **Preparation of Arka Kalpana**

As per the Arka Prakash, the term "Arka" denotes medicinal extracts that are prepared via distillation. This extraction technique guarantees a concentrated and strong form of the medicinal qualities of the plants.

Different parts of medicinal plants, such as leaves, fruits, flowers, roots, or bark are gathered and cleaned thoroughly in order to produce Arka Kalpana. After that, they are pulverized into a rough powder. This powder is combined with water and put in an Alembic, a wide-mouthed jar. To allow the water to gradually evaporate, the Alembic is carefully heated on mid-flame. After rising through a condenser, the steam cools down and liquefies once more. The condensed liquid is collected separately in a sterile glass container and contains the active chemicals and essential oils of the plant material.

Until all of the desired components have been successfully removed, this process may be repeated multiple times. The end result is called Arka Kalpana, a potent elixir well-known for its healing properties in Shalakya Tantra ailments.

#### **Properties of Good Quality Arka:**

- 1. When Arka is prepared, its scent outweighs the odor of the natural extracts it is prepared from
- 2. Arka color should resemble the pure white color of conch shells.
- 3. The taste of Arka is similar to the taste of the medicinal drug from which it is processed.
- 4. Compared to other pharmaceutical forms of the same medicine, Arka, the most concentrated extract of the drug, has greater therapeutic potency to cure the underlying medical condition.

For instance, Arddhavabhedakahara Arka is recommended for migraine, Netrarogaghna Arka is prescribed for all kinds of eye disorders like conjunctivitis as it helps reduce inflammation and promotes healing, Chagalamutra Arka is effective against ear infections and provides relief from pain and itching, Sunthyadya Arka is beneficial in alleviating sneezing and Jatipatradya Arka is useful in curing stomatitis.

#### **Mode of Action of Drugs**

Examining the drug's mode of action in Arka Kalpana is an intriguing topic. The ancient literature Arka Prakash states that one of the most important ways to improve the healing properties of these substances is through the distillation procedure.

The process of distillation entails heating herbal drugs and gathering the condensed vapors.
