Literature Review

The review of literature offers a comprehensive exploration of the dynamic landscape of medical tourism in India. (Zhong L et al., 2021)⁽¹⁸⁾ Reviewed 802 articles published in the peer reviewed journals internationally. The study was conducted to respond to integrate all the research work done on medical tourism. It included all the study for the period of 50 years from 1970 to 2020 and used the software CiteSpace. They included major articles indexed in the Web of Science and Scopus and collected data from 802 articles and analysed. The major variables focussed were Markets, destination and development environments. The sub-variables for each major variables were demand and behaviour to rule out markets, development and promotions for destinations and last but not the least policies and impacts for development environment. They concluded in their study that for the successful medical-health-wellness tourism, countries should thrive to explore their fullest potential to attract more tourists with good destinations. They also identified the influential factors like accessibility, procedural options, treatment facilities, travel arrangements, safety guarantees and government policies. Despite with all these measures, meeting or exceeding the patient's expectation is the major contribution for the success of the medical tourism. (Neil Lunt and Percivil Carrera, 2010)⁽¹⁵⁾ reviewed he dimension of health care in globalized economy. People travelled for treatments of cosmetic and dental surgeries, generic problems, bariatric surgeries, and IVF and organ transplantation. They identified the medical tourist literature for payments modes like out of pockets, their experience focussing on the patients with midlife and beyond.

The study conducted (Johnston, R., Crooks, V.A., Snyder, J. et al. 2010)⁽⁵⁾ drawing data from the academic articles, literature and media sources from eighteen data bases and used scoping review protocol to synthesize the information for understanding the effects of medical tourism in destination and departure countries. The review design had three main stages like identifying the question and relevant literature, selecting the literature and charting, collating and summarizing the data. The majority of sources in their studies brought the perspective on increasing flow of patients from high income nations to lower and middle income nations. The identified major five reasons for choosing these nations were solution to health system problems, standard of care and hospitality. In spite of the positive results, the team also observes that the effects of medical tourism is becoming unreliable and geographically restricted.

The literature on ethical and legal issues represents a multifaceted and dynamic field that explores the intricate relationship between moral principles and legal frameworks across various domains of human life. This extensive body of work delves into topics as diverse as healthcare ethics, business ethics, environmental ethics, human rights, and more, shedding light on the complexities, dilemmas, and evolving standards that shape our understanding of right and wrong within the context of the law. This review aims to provide a concise overview of key themes and findings within this expansive area of study. (Kassim PN, 2009)⁽⁷⁾ discussed about the ease and the affordability which primarily contributed to the fast growth of health care diligence by making people to travel all around the world for the medical, dental and surgical procedures along with time allotted for vacation and make use of the opportunity to experience the attractions of the countries. He also brought out salient features of favourable currency exchange rates and the evidences of the proven safety healthcare practices in selected foreign nations. He also addressed the ethical and legal issues pertaining to the malpractice, consumer protection, alternative medicine and organ trafficking.

The literature on travel and logistic issues in medical tourism covers a multifaceted exploration of the complex dynamics involved in seeking healthcare services across international borders. Medical tourism, the practice of traveling abroad for medical treatment, has seen significant growth in recent years, presenting a myriad of logistical and ethical challenges. This literature review offers an overview of the key themes, challenges, and emerging solutions within the realm of medical tourism logistics. It delves into issues such as patient mobility, healthcare infrastructure, legal regulations, cultural considerations, and the role of technology in reshaping the landscape of global healthcare access. (Malhotra, Dave 2022)⁽¹³⁾ identified factors

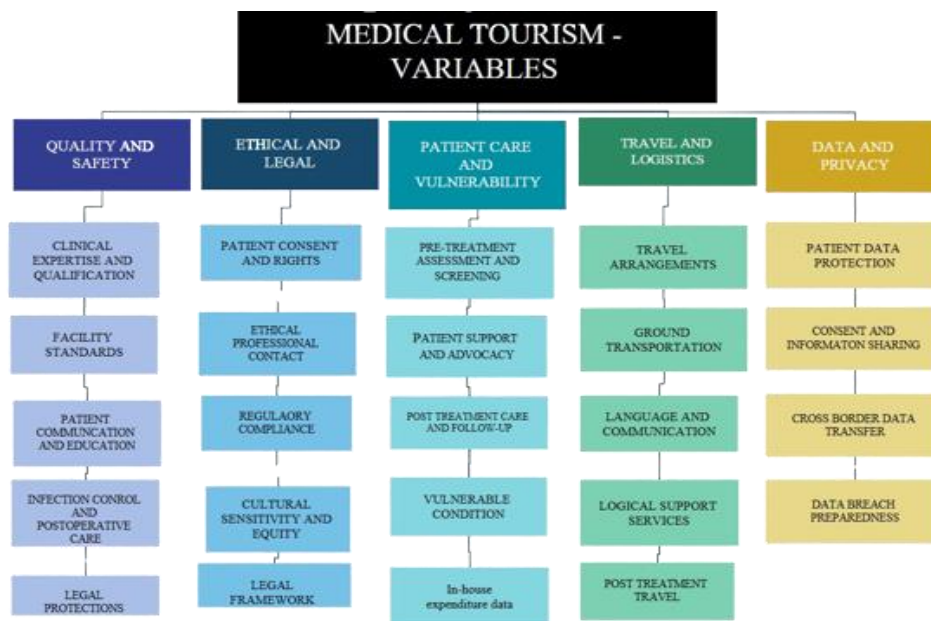
influencing the Delhi- NCR's suggestion as a medical tourism hub. They studied the variables such as destination and its assessment on country's competence and government support as a facilitator. They also considered the discussions and the respondents' views on their medical tourism experience to India, its benefits and implications. The results from their extensive study revealed that India is the world's one of the most preferred medical tourist destinations and it is expected to grow steadily. According to the study, cost competitiveness, medical professional's expertise, quality health care services and cultural factors were considered to be the most common influencing factor for the preference of India being the destination for the medical tourism.

Shripad Naik ⁽⁴⁾ Union Minister of State for Tourism and Ports & Shipping and Waterways, India to Economic Times published in TravelWorld.com mentioned that more than 1.4mn medical tourists visited India in 2022.

(Mudur G 2004)⁽¹⁴⁾ published interesting facts on how Indian hospitals wooing foreign patients to travel to India for the treatment with mind blowing positive and effective strategies. He narrated a true incident where a British woman suffering from osteoarthritis with excruciating pain could not afford to wait for her turn in NHS or private treatment in UK for her hip replacement. She flew to India on a 10 hours journey and came to South Indian hospital globally reputed and the most famous among Indian patients The Apollo for her surgery. She successfully underwent a Birmingham hip resurfacing procedure and went home within three weeks and visited traditional herbal medicine centre arranged by the hospital. Hospitals in Mumbai, Chennai, and New Delhi have a history of serving patients from South Asian and Gulf countries. Currently, they are extending their reach to attract patients from Africa, Europe, and North America, positioning themselves as hubs offering top-tier medical services at competitive prices. The prime reason is the quality care, quality service and safety. According to Dr. Vijay Bose, the surgeon who recently performed a hip resurfacing procedure on a patient from Norwich, the cost of this procedure in India is approximately \$5,000, while it can be as high as \$15,000 in Europe. Officials at Escorts Heart Institute state that the total cost, including a cardiac bypass procedure and air travel, would amount to around \$6,000 in India, in contrast to the \$23,000 cost at a private hospital in Britain or the \$30,000 cost in the United States. Indian doctors and health professionals are globally renowned for their clinical expertise and qualifications. (Daniel Block 2018)⁽³⁾ Many have received rigorous training and gained experience both in India and internationally, ensuring top-tier medical care and contributing to India's status as a medical tourism destination. Facility standards in India's healthcare sector

have seen substantial improvements in recent years. Many hospitals and medical centers now adhere to international accreditation and quality benchmarks, incorporating state-of-the-art technology and modern infrastructure.

(Parasuraman et al⁽¹⁶⁾., 1994; Kitapci et al⁽⁸⁾., 2014; Dasanayaka et al⁽²⁾.,2012; Liyanage and Egbu⁽¹⁰⁾ (2005) studies stressed enhancing quality in healthcare necessitates a strong emphasis on the medical qualifications and clinical effectiveness of healthcare staff. As emphasized in the Quality Digest which publishes articles as an e-store mentions that the quality entails meeting customer requirements while optimizing cost-efficiency, integrating preventive measures into processes, and ensuring the timely delivery of the best possible product to the end user. This approach underscores the significance of well-qualified and clinically adept healthcare professionals in achieving these quality objectives. This commitment to upgrading facility standards enhances the country's appeal as a destination for medical tourists.

Patient communication and education in India's healthcare system are becoming increasingly patient-centric. Healthcare providers are investing in clear and culturally sensitive communication, ensuring that patients are well-informed about their conditions and treatment options. This approach enhances the overall patient experience and empowers individuals to make informed healthcare decisions. Legal practices in the context of medical tourism in India serve as a cornerstone for safeguarding patient rights, maintaining accountability, and ensuring ethical healthcare delivery. (Malhotra, N., Dave, K 2022)⁽¹²⁾ Stringent regulations encompass licensing requirements, liability provisions, and data protection policies. This comprehensive legal framework is pivotal in upholding patient safety, satisfaction, and trust, all while fostering the sustainable growth of the medical tourism industry.

(Sarwar et al., 2016)⁽¹⁷⁾ discussed about the policy making and problems related to the legal constitution since there are no legal protection for the overseas patients. According to them, this situation arises due to the lack of proper government regulations in the insurance policies and would expose the foreign patient's life at risk while visiting. Pre-treatment assessment and screening hold paramount importance as these processes are the initial steps in ensuring patient safety, treatment efficacy, and the overall success of the medical journey. Thorough assessments help in determining the suitability of patients for specific treatments and identifying potential risks or contraindications. They provide a foundation for informed decision-making and the creation of personalized treatment plans, which ultimately contribute to positive clinical outcomes and patient satisfaction. (Lunt N, Fung K-w 2022)⁽¹¹⁾

Additionally, these assessments enable the early identification of any underlying health conditions, which is vital for the management of comorbidities and minimizing post-operative complications. In essence, pre-treatment assessments and screening are integral to delivering safe and effective healthcare services in the context of medical tourism.

Indian medical tourism faces distinct challenges when dealing with patients with vulnerable conditions. (Danni Zheng et al 2023)⁽¹⁾ insisted on providing specialized care for those with pre-existing health issues, the elderly, and paediatric patients demands a higher level of attention and tailored services. These vulnerable groups require meticulous risk assessment, well-coordinated post-operative care, and clear communication, which can be complicated by language and cultural differences. Meeting these challenges is essential to ensuring their well-being, safety, and a positive medical tourism experience. Indian medical facilities must continue to adapt and enhance their services to address the unique needs of these vulnerable patient populations, further solidifying India's reputation as a global healthcare destination.

(Karadayi-Usta et al 2020)⁽⁶⁾ made a conceptual study and brought of significant information on medical tourism supply chain. This paper discussed requirement of supply chain support right from the ambulance or transportation service from the airport to hotel or hospital, accommodation and to & fro services from hotel to hospital and tourist spots, booking of flight tickets and billing etc. The study concluded that the success of medical tourism services demands the coordinated and joint activity of the involved parties. The study collected information from the various study visualized and demonstrated the structure and members of the supply chain. The study concluded enhancing the system comprehension to result in improved process development and control. It suggested that supply chain stakeholders can optimize their internal operations and supply chain activities by embracing this conceptual framework. This approach enables each member to assess their role, align business processes, and foster effective collaboration with partners. Data breach preparedness is paramount in the context of medical tourism. As medical records and sensitive patient information cross borders, ensuring robust strategies for data security and breach response is critical. This preparedness includes establishing clear protocols for detecting and reporting breaches, safeguarding patient privacy, and notifying affected parties promptly. Medical tourism stakeholders must also invest in cybersecurity measures, encryption, and staff training to reduce the risks of data breaches, protecting patients and upholding trust in the industry.
