Prominent Indian author of modern literature Amitav Ghosh has contributed significantly to the literary examination of environmental challenges. His writings are highly recognized for their profound exploration of ecological, historical, and cultural issues, making them valuable resources for ecocritical analysis (Lakshmi, 2024). Ghosh's novels often show the damage that industrialization, global capitalism, and colonial exploitation have done to the environment while simultaneously emphasizing the close ties that exist between humans and their surroundings (Parui, 2022). The Glass Palace examines how colonialism and industrialization affected Burma (Myanmar) and India's natural environments. While not about the environment, *The Shadow Lines* illuminates location, identity, and memory. This research only covers Ghosh's novels, not his non-fiction or other writings. The paper also covers ecocriticism, although not exhaustively.
